

Farm Science Review Hall of Fame

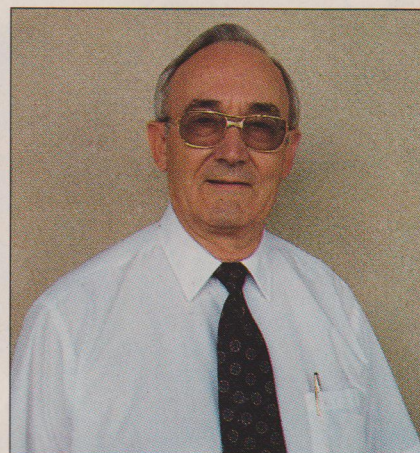
■ The Farm Science Review Hall of Fame was established in 1990 to recognize outstanding individual contributions to the Farm Science Review. Inductees are permanently recognized at both the Molly Caren Agricultural Center and the Agricultural Administration Building on Ohio State University's main campus. Congratulations to this year's inductees.



Thomas M. Stockdale, a retired natural resources professor, was instrumental in developing the first conservation area at the Review. He helped initiate and coordinate the participation of the Ohio Department of Natural Resources and Soil Conservation Services in the Review's current Gwynne Conservation Area. Tom served on the Program and Policy Committee for 12 years and was recognized in 1988 for 25 years of support to the Review.



Ted L. Jones provided tremendous leadership as the Review's Program and Policy Committee chair for 11 of his 15 years on the committee. In 1983, he directed the Capital Improvement Committee in planning for the development of the Molly Caren Agricultural Center. As an Ohio Extension administrator, Ted ran the county agent volunteer program and now continues to volunteer his time and services to the Review.



For 25 years, William L. George was the backbone of day-to-day work as the superintendent for the Review. His many contributions include improving the site's physical appearance, working closely with student employees and helping to move the Review from Don Scott Field to its current location.
